Professor Richard A. Cohen, the Isaac Swift Distinguished Professor of Judaic Studies at the University of North Carolina, Charlotte will talk on "The Time of Ethics" at 2:10 p.m., Monday, October 29 in Buttrick 103. Professor Cohen is the author and editor of innumerable major works on Emmanuel Levinas, Paul Ricoeur, and Continental Philosophy such as "Face to Face with Levinas" and "Ricoeur as Another."

His more recent and forthcoming works include "Ethics, Exegesis and Philosophy: Interpretation after Levinas"; "The Wisdom of Love: Philosophical-Ethical Dialogues"; "Levinas and Spinoza"; "Political Monotheism: Justice, Ethics, Religion and Power – Levinasian Perspectives."

His talk will be followed by a group discussion with Professor Cohen on "Conversations on Ethics and Society: The Time of Levinas-I" that will include Professor Lisa Guenther and Katharine Loevy of the Department of Philosophy and others. The follow-up discussion with Professor Cohen will be held in 015 Buttrick beginning at 3:15 p.m.

Second Presbyterian Church of Nashville will host a free screening of the documentary "Golden Rule Ethics: Reclaiming the Rightful Role of Faith in Politics" on Thursday, November 8, beginning at 7 p.m.

Produced by the Nashville based Baptist Center for Ethics, the documentary is rooted in the theological conviction that God is neither a Republican nor a Democrat and that neither party is thoroughly moral nor completely immoral.

The DVD explores the rightful role of faith in politics through interviews with clergy and politicians in Alabama, Missouri and Tennessee. It expands the moral agenda from the narrow list of issues prioritized by the Christian Right to the fuller expression of issues found in the Christian tradition, beginning with the biblical priority of doing justice.

A panel headed by the Rev. Robert Parham of the Center will respond to the 30 minute documentary.

The screening is co-sponsored by *Doing Justly*, a multi-denominational coalition of Christians in Nashville who seek to help church members better learn how to “walk the walk” of faith.

30th Annual Holocaust Series: Broken Silence

This coming week's events in Vanderbilt's Thirtieth Annual Holocaust Lecture Series.

"Deep Evil and Deep Good: The Concept of Human Nature Confronts the Holocaust"

Between June 1942 and May 1943, a battalion of some five hundred German reserve police officers, many working-class family men, made their way through occupied Poland killing 38,000 Jews, one-by-one, face-to-face. During these same months on the other side of Europe, the villagers of the southern French town of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon secretly took in thousands of Jewish refugees, hid them on outlying farms, fed them and clothed them, and arranged for their escape to neutral Switzerland. Professor Michael Bess examines the various strategies that have been followed by historians, psychologists, social scientists, and philosophers, in the effort to explain the chasm that separates the wartime behavior of such seemingly "ordinary" groups of Europeans. Professor Bess is the Chancellor’s Professor of History at Vanderbilt University specializing in twentieth century Europe. He is the author of three books including *Choices Under Fire: Moral Dimensions of World War II* (2006).

"Children of Hitler’s War"

Lecture, Flynn Auditorium, Law School

The Nazis put children at the heart of their racial war; German and Jewish, Polish and Czech, Sinti and disabled children were all to be separated along racial lines, ultimately, between those who were to live and those who were to die. At the same time, children fell prey to bombing, mechanised warfare, starvation policies and mass flight. But children were not only passive victims; they became active participants, going out to smuggle food, ply the black market, and care for sick parents and siblings. As they absorbed the brutal new realities of German occupation, they acted it out in their games: Polish boys playing at being Gestapo interrogators and Jewish children at being ghetto guards or the SS. Drawing on a wide range of new sources, from welfare and medical files to private diaries, letters and drawings, Professor Nicholas Stargardt evokes the individual voices of children under Nazi rule and brings their experiences of the war together. Professor Stargardt has written extensively about modern German history and the Holocaust, most notably in his acclaimed *Witnesses of War: Children’s Lives under the Nazis* (2006 and

2007). He is a Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford, where he teaches modern European History.
