1. CHILDREN - WANTED & UNWANTED: On Infant Exposure, Foundlings, And Adoption In Neo Babylonian Society (6th Century Bce)

This presentation examines the evidence on child abandonment and adoption from Neo-Babylonian legal records written on clay in comparison with earlier, contemporary and later sources. Cuneiform law provides a well-established framework for the transfer of children under different circumstances and conditions. Examples of legal symbolism and fiction (i.e. placing a child's foot on clay, throwing a child to a dog) are discussed and the position of the child in his or her new household with respect to status and inheritance rights is reviewed.

2. THE MERCHANTS OF BABYLON: Entrepreneurs in the 6th c. BCE

This PowerPoint presentation focuses on an exceptional family of entrepreneurs for over five generations, in comparison to its contemporaries. In a culture dominated by palace and temple economies, this family's business patterns and strategies, networks of influence, access to institutional resources, political circumstances and kinship alliances, investment patterns and business risks, and relation to the temples-all played a productive role that shaped Neo-Babylonian economic life well after Persia integrated Babylon within its empire.
