

Hendry and manager Lou Piniella are also hoping Kremyr can bolster an injury-plagued rotation, which has annually been set back by the aching arms of Kerry Wood and Mark Prior and the worms slowly eating away at Carlos Zambrano's brain. Meanwhile, the Cubs' division rival, World Series Champion St. Louis Cardinals, have countered the deal by signing Brian Forster, who had a Hall of Fame pitching career in the PS2 game "MLB '06: The Show."

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McCain Calls For Return To 'Original Republican Principles'

Slavery must not be allowed to expand into western territories, says Arizona Senator



With both parties still adjusting to the impact of the Democratic capture of Congress in the recent midterm elections, Arizona Senator and potential 2008 Republican nominee John McCain has called for his party to return to its "original principles." McCain claimed that the GOP's 2006 losses could be explained mainly by a betrayal of what Republicans were meant to stand for.

McCain made his argument in a speech to the Heritage Foundation a week after the results were in. After apologizing profusely for ever having dared to criticise the Republican leadership for anything, the Senator laid out his explanation for the recent electoral setbacks. "Our party has lost its way," McCain told his audience, "As Americans, we are taught to live up to the principles of our founding document - the U.S. Constitution. "As Republicans," McCain continued, "We need to focus on our own founding moment - that historic meeting of a few cranky moralists in Ripon back in 1854. It is the principles laid down at Ripon that will guide us back to power and me to the Presidency - which is why I say to you now, we must stop the expansion of slavery, turn back the papal menace that is daily flooding our nation with new Irish immigrants and thwart the southern conspiracy to rule the nation!"

McCain is widely considered a likely candidate for the Republican presidential nomination in 2008, and in recent months has been seeking to shore up his conservative credentials by speaking out against gay marriage and taking other socially conservative stands. The Heritage Foundation speech has accordingly been interpreted by some as a further attempt to appease the party's conservative base.

Richard Scaife, a Trustee of the Heritage Foundation, welcomed McCain's move to the right. "For too long, American politicians have been applying 20th century solutions to disturbingly liberal elements. "While we appreciate that in the current P.C. atmosphere there are certain moral objections to supporting slavery, the attempt to prevent it spreading West

21st century problems," said Scaife, "It is clearly evident that they have failed, and I for one believe that it is time we tried some 19th century solutions. If that means a return to the gold standard, so much the better."

Despite Scaife's indications that McCain's conservative bona fides were now credible, not all on the right were convinced of this. The American Enterprise Institute (A.E.I.), a rival conservative think-tank, said that the Ripon platform of 1854 contained

by government action is a violation of free-market principles," said A.E.I. President Christopher DeMuth, "Likewise the Senator's desire to give away homesteads at below market prices is a further extension of welfare-state social engineering that no true conservative could support."

DeMuth further described McCain's criticism of the Kansas-Nebraska Act, which allowed those states to decide their form of government by "popular sovereignty," as a "violation of the sacred principle of states' rights." Said DeMuth, "People are sick and tired of the federal government seeking to control their lives. Once again, Senator McCain is doing little more than spouting the far left's talking points and favoring Big Government."

The responses from the leadership of both major parties to McCain's comments were also on balance critical, with senior figures on both sides of the aisle accusing McCain of seeking media attention. Democrats, especially in Nancy Pelosi's office, are said to be upset at McCain's attempt to spark disagreement within Republican ranks. According to a source in Pelosi's office, the Speaker-elect is concerned that McCain's speech will distract media attention away from her attempt to single-handedly wipe out the Democrats' political credibility even before the new Congress assembles.

Meanwhile, White House Press Secretary Tony Snow also responded negatively to McCain's comments, describing the Senator's thinking as out of date. "We all respect the contribution that Senator McCain has made to our party," Snow told reporters, "but the agenda he is now advocating is hopelessly out of date and has no place in the modern Republican Party. It sounds like the Senator wants us to become little more than a collection of sanctimonious, xenophobic corporate shills who whip up popular support by scaring people with endless stories of unproven conspiracies. Today's Republican Party would never stand for that."

In a press statement responding to attacks on his speech, Senator McCain said that such criticism would not deter he would continue speaking out for what he believes in just so long as it doesn't upset any major Republican donors.
