
Cultivated Jews and Black Folk:

Dian Kriz is Associate Professor of the History of Art and Architecture at Brown University. Her scholarship focuses on landscape painting as a locus of national and colonial identity in Britain from the late eighteenth to the mid-nineteenth century. She is the author of The Idea of the English Landscape Painter: Genius as Alibi in the Early Nineteenth Century (Yale University Press, 1997), and co-editor of An Economy of Colour: Visual Culture and the Atlantic World, 1660-1820 (Manchester University Press, 2003). Dr. Kriz is currently working on a new book, "Sugar, Slavery and the Culture of Refinement," an examination of various forms of visual imagery that pertain to the colonial exchange of goods and humans.
