Just a short walk from campus, visitors can find a retreat in the beauty of Centennial Park. Located on West End Avenue, the park offers many options for those seeking an adventure into a world of simple pleasures.

The fields have a great amount of space for playing Frisbee or football. There also is a jungle gym that allows you to swing to your heart's desire if sports are not up your alley.

Picnics are wonderful under the lush awnings of oak trees. Or, if you simply need a place to get away, bring a blanket and enjoy the view of the gardens and pond. If you want to make some new friends, bring a bag of bread and the ducks will waddle up to make your acquaintance.

For a historic lesson, visit the Parthenon. The Parthenon is located on the grounds of Centennial Park and houses a permanent collection of 63 paintings by 19th and 20th century artists. Additional gallery space allows for temporary exhibits. Inside is a giant reproduction of the original Parthenon's lost statue of Athena as well as exhibits of the frieze figures and lessons on how the Parthenon was built. If you are not able to make it during daylight hours for the art, a nighttime visit is still quite lovely with the white stone of the Parthenon's exterior sitting grandly beneath the dark blanket of sky.



SUMMER SPINS

Outgoing Music Editor Avery Spofford samples a few of this summer's most anticipated albums, giving readers an idea of what they should be spinning over their summer vacation.

PASSION PIT: "MANNERS" (MAY 19)

Hailed by some as the second coming to messianic dance-floor darlings MGMT, Passion Pit has held its place as the favorite of the blogosphere since last year's September debut, "Chunk of Change." With the release of its first full-length ("Manners") this summer, however, the five-piece act is faced with a sink-or-swim situation: a successful release could mean widespread mainstream recognition, whereas a failed sophomore effort could reduce the band to just another flash in the pan. But, with psychedelic hit "Sleepyhead" already under their belts and a mind-blowing video for "The Reeling," the first single off "Manners," my money's on success and Passion Pit as 2009's breakthrough summer album.

DAVE MATTHEWS BAND: WHISKEY AND THE GROOGRUX KING (JUNE 2)

Although still in mourning at the death of their much-acclaimed saxophonist, the late LeRoi Moore, college favorites Dave Matthews Band are gearing up for the release of their seventh studio album this summer, "Whiskey and the GrooGrux King."

The band has not released a full-length studio album since 2005's "Stand Up," which topped the Billboard charts at No. 1 and showcased home-grown favorite "American Baby" as one of the album's strongest tracks.

The first single from the album, "Funny the Way It Is," was available for free download for one week on the Dave Matthews Band website and features the band's trademark relaxed vibe and jam-based sound.

LIL' WAYNE: REBIRTH (JUNE 9)

Also releasing a seventh studio album this summer is "The Best Rapper Alive:" New Orleans-bred flow sensation Lil' Wayne.

Wayne's summer release of "Tha Carter III" proved to be the smash hit of the year, winning a total of three Grammy Awards (including Album of the Year), and Lil' Wayne fans expect nothing but more of the best from the international sensation.

The sound on "Rebirth," however, will come as a surprise to some: the album will be Wayne's first foray into the rock genre. A preview of the album has already been released, a debut single that only the truest Lil' Wayne fan could love: "Prom Queen" is a dragging, ear-bleeding track that has left many of us wondering, "Weezy, WTF?"

Still, after "Tha Carter III" even the most dubious critic would admit that Wayne's release is one of the most anticipated of the season.

WILCO: WILCO (JUNE 30)

We've always known that seven is a lucky number: Chicagoan alternative rockers Wilco will also release their seventh studio album this summer, the eponymously-titled "Wilco."

Although the album leaked in its entirety on May 13, the band has responded with grace: the entire album is now streaming live from the official Wilco website, and the band is putting a lien on illegal downloaders to donate their guilt money to a local Chicago charity.

Wilco is a Grammy Award-winning rock act featuring influences from across the board: both country and alternative rock have been cited as major genres within the group's music, and Rolling Stone magazine has called Wilco "America's foremost rock impressionists." ■
