Dr. ANANDA ABEYSEKARA currently teaches in the Department of Interdisciplinary Studies at Virginia Polytechnic Institute in Blacksburg, VA. He received his Ph.D. from Northwestern University (1999). His first book, COLORS OF THE ROBE: RELIGION, IDENTITY, AND DIFFERENCE, has received the 2003 American Academy of Religion Award as "Best First Book in the History of Religion". In the last issue of JAAR you can find his most recent article, "Identity for and against Itself: Religion, Criticism, and Pluralization," in Journal of the American Academy of Religion (Dec. 2004, Vol. 72, #4). His areas of expertise include: Buddhism and Politics, Religion and Violence, Theory and Method in the Study of Religion, Intersection of the ethnography of religion, nationalism, political theory, and postcolonial criticism in South Asia.

Dr. KATHERINE ULRICH, will lecture on "Methodology for the Study of Divided Bodies: Death, Sacrifice, and Fragmentation in Hinduism and Early Buddhism" Thursday, Nov 11, 2004: 1:10-2:35 pm in Garland Hall, 301-F (reception follows)

Dr. KATHERINE ULRICH currently teaches at Wesleyan University, holds her Ph.D. (2002) from the University of Chicago (History of Religions). Her first book, -- DIVIDED BODIES: DEATH, SACRIFICE, AND FRAGMENTATION IN HINDUISM AND EARLY BUDDHISM, under review by a press, is the result of field work research in India. Her expertise includes South Asian Religions, Cultures, and History (Hinduism, Buddhism, Jjainism); Methods and Theories of Religious Studies; Religious Rituals & Practices; Gender and Religion; Sanskrit, Tamil, and Pali Languages and Literatures; Islam in South Asia..
