Mark A. Rothstein, director of the Institute for Bioethics, Health Policy and Law at the
University of Louisville, will speak on "Who Will Benefit from Pharmacogenomics?" on
Monday, April 7th.

The promise of pharmacogenomics is that by providing medications that are matched to the genetic make up of patients adverse drug reactions may be avoided and the effectiveness of the medications may be improved. Professor Rothstein will focus on issues of access to and allocation of resources. This talk will place pharmacogenomics in the broader context of social issues in medical discovery.

The public lecture, sponsored by Vanderbilt's Cal Turner Program in Moral Leadership for the Professions, will be on April 7 at 4:10 p.m. in 208 Light Hall, with a reception following. Vanderbilt faculty members Drs. Ellen Wright Clayton and Alfred L. George Jr., director of Genetic Medicine, will respond to the presentation.
