# First-years compete for a greener Vanderbilt

In 2007, Vanderbilt consumed over 363,000 megawatt-hours of electricity, the same amount of electricity consumed by the almost 23,500 homes in the Nashville area last year.

Starting Monday, Oct. 6, each house in the Commons will be participating in a House Energy Competition that might serve to reduce this energy consumption.

The competition, sponsored by

Students Promoting Environmental Awareness and Responsibility, is set to last for the entire month, ending on Nov. 3. The winning house will be determined by the greatest percent reduction in kilowatt use per square foot from last month. The prize is a pizza party with masseuses from the Wellness Resource Center.

According to SustainVU's website, The Commons Center is a gold-certified LEED building, meaning that it is 28 percent more energy efficient than other buildings of its type. Exemplifying

the recent changes on campus regarding sustainability, the Commons houses provide a great site to host this

SPEAR's mission is to promote more environmentally sustainable practices and infrastructure on campus and in the greater Nashville community, and its goal is that the House Energy Competition will both raise awareness and establish new habits among the first-year students. The group hopes all Vanderbilt students will become conscious of their individual impact on the environment; however,

they realize this will take time and effort on their part.

"It takes two weeks for habits to form. We're hoping that in the course of a month, students will form sustainable habits that will stick for the rest of the year," said Vice President of SPEAR sophomore Leslie Labruto.

Some of the new habits Labruto mentioned were turning off lights when leaving a room, including bathrooms and common areas, using only cold water for laundry, taking shorter showers and controlling thermostats.

"This is the first year students can control the thermostats, so that's a huge way to save energy. Just lower it a couple

of degrees," Labruto said. More "greener living tips" will be provided by SustainVU each week of the competition on its website, http://www.vanderbilt.edu/sustainvu. # Colleges scramble as investment fund freezes

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—An investment fund that serves about 1,000 colleges and private schools partially froze withdrawals this week amid the credit crunch, forcing colleges to develop new plans to pay bills.

Wachovia Bank, trustee for the \$9.3 billion Short Term Fund offered by Commonfund, said Monday it was terminating the fund and establishing a process to ensure the orderly liquidation and distribution of the fund's assets. Wachovia initially told investors Monday that they could only withdraw 10 percent of their money, but that figure was increased to 34 percent by Wednesday and 37 percent by Thursday.

About 200 colleges and universities have about \$1 billion in the intermediate fund, which is used for long-term needs, such as equipment plant purchases, he said.

Partially freezing the Short Term Fund as officials prepare for liquidation prevents a run on money and protects investors, said Laura Fay, a Wachovia spokeswoman.

The fund provides returns slightly above U.S. Treasury bills. About 85 percent of the fund was invested in high-quality commercial paper from blue chip companies, while the rest is in securities backed by mortgages and other assets, Luke said.

Amid the housing industry slump and turmoil affecting banks and credit markets, such investments have become increasingly unpopular as investors seek safer options like Treasury bills.

# Bailout hopes rise as more 'no' votes

WASHINGTON (AP)—Desperate to avoid another market-crushing defeat, House leaders won key converts Thursday to the \$700 billion financial industry bailout on the eve of a make-or-break second vote.

President Bush and congressional leaders lobbied furiously for the dozen or so supporters they'd need to reverse Monday's stunning setback and approve a massive rescue plan designed to stave off national economic disaster.

Anything but reassured, investors sent the Dow Jones industrials plunging another 348 points, suggesting Wall Street is expecting tougher economic times even if the measure is rushed into law. The Federal Reserve reported record emergency lending to banks and investment firms, fresh evidence of the credit troubles squeezing the country.

The top Republican vote-counter, Rep. Roy Blunt of Missouri, did predict the measure would be approved.

Minds were changing in both parties in favor of the muchmaligned measure, which would let the government spend billions of dollars to buy bad mortgage-related securities and other devalued assets from troubled financial institutions. If the plan works, advocates say, that would allow frozen credit to begin flowing again and prevent a serious recession.

The Senate breathed new life into the measure Wednesday after the stinging House defeat, voting 74-25 to approve the bailout, with additions designed to appeal to key constituencies. Business lobbyists were also inundating Capitol Hill in a rush to win over wavering lawmakers in both parties.

# Suicide attackers strike Shiite mosques, kill 24

**BAGHDAD** (AP)—Suicide bombers struck two Shiite mosques in Baghdad on Thursday, killing at least 24 people and wounding dozens during celebrations marking the end of the Islamic holy month of Ramadan.

To the north, suspected Shiite militiamen gunned down six members of a Sunni family, including women and children, police reported.

Those attacks occurred four days after a series of explosions killed 32 people and wounded nearly 100 in Shiite areas of Baghdad, raising fears that al-Qaida in Irag is trying to provoke Sunni-Shiite reprisal killings now that the last of the American "surge" troops have left the country.

In the deadliest attack, a suicide car bomber detonated his explosives about 20 yards from a mosque in Zafaraniyah in southeastern Baghdad. The blast killed 14 people, including three Iraqi soldiers, and wounded 28, police said.

The death toll would likelier have been higher, but Iraqi soldiers prevented the attacker from driving closer to the mosque, police said.

In the other attack in the capital, a suicide bomber who appeared to be in his late teens detonated his explosive belt as worshippers were leaving the Rasoul mosque in the eastern New Baghdad district.

Ten people died and 24 were wounded, police and officials at al-Kindi and Ibn al-Nasif hospitals said. The dead included a guard who blocked the attacker from entering the mosque, police said.

The Iraqi army said 17 people were killed in the two blasts. But area hospitals said that figure did not include victims who died later from their wounds.

# Somali pirates stick to \$20 million ransom demand


MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP)—A Somali pirate spokesman says his group will not release a hijacked Ukrainian cargo ship loaded with arms for less than \$20 million. Sugule Ali told the Associated Press on Thursday the pirates

would "never" reduce the ransom of the Ukrainian freighter loaded with 33 Soviet-designed tanks and other weapons. The MV Faina was seized last Thursday and is now anchored off the coast of central Somalia.

The pirates have been negotiating with the ship's owners. There are 20 crew aboard the ship.

Ali warned that any attempt at deception or commando raids on the ship would be met with repercussions.







# Professors balance demands of teaching, research institution

When it comes to maintaining the balance between research and teaching, faculty members at Vanderbilt sometimes struggle to perform both at the high level that is required of

"(Research and teaching) are both very time consuming. I do think it is a challenge, but

we have a great faculty that is capable of doing this," said the Interim Dean of the College of Arts and Science Carolyn Dever. "When faculty members are evaluated for promotions there are three criteria: teaching excellence, research excellence and service to the Vanderbilt community, and the first two are the most important of the three."

The demand for research

varies within each department. While humanities departments require the publishing of books and articles, faculty in the sciences usually focus on journal articles.

"We expect that engineering faculty will be engaged in research that will be influential, published and externally supported," said Dean of the School of Engineering Kenneth F. Galloway. "We measure this

by the number of publications, the impact of the work, the external financial support, the success of students mentored and the written opinion of experts in the faculty member's area of expertise."

Sometimes the pressure of publishing to obtain tenure can interfere with the time devoted to teaching, according to some professors. Since at Vanderbilt teaching and research are

equally valued, faculty members have to manage to excel in both of them.

"Teaching is highly valued. Through the years, I have seen faculty members that have strong records of scholarship but they haven't attained tenure because their teaching is lacking," said James H. Hogge, associate dean of Peabody.

The pressure of publishing also comes from the fact that a

large number of well-published faculty means the prestige of the school improves.

"Researchisanimportantstep not only for the faculty member, but also for the institution. This is one of those instances where the member and the institution merge and this is better for the students too because then the school's reputation where they are attending will be better," Hogge said.

# Tenn. teacher in Texas after teen lover was slain

KNOXVILLE, Tenn.—A teacher who disappeared after

her then-husband killed her 18-year-old lover is living in Texas with her sons and another teenage man, according to testimony at a hearing Wednesday on who should get custody of the boys.

Erin McLean was having an affair with Sean Powell when her then-husband shot him in the head in 2007. She met Powell while student teaching at his high school.

McLean, who was 29 at the time, dropped out of sight when she left Knoxville with the couple's two sons, 12-year-old Eric and 9-year-old Ian, soon after the shooting.

She was listed as a witness but didn't testify when exhusband Eric McLean was tried on a first-degree murder charge last month. He testified that he accidentally shot Powell while trying to get him to leave the couple's home.

Jurors convicted him of reckless homicide after hearing

evidence that Erin McLean had flaunted her affair.

The McLeans divorced in February, and Eric McLean, who is not in prison, was granted visitation with the boys. His sentencing is set for next month, but he's unlikely to serve time.

His divorce attorney, Steve Sharp, told The Knoxville News Sentinel that Eric McLean hasn't seen his children since Erin McLean left. Sharp said he tracked them to Austin, Texas, where they were living with an 18-year-old. ■



# Financial aid plan works

The university has revealed a new financial aid system policy unlike any other in the country. By eliminating need-based loans and increasing institutional grants to students in order to meet need, Vanderbilt has ensured that any student admissible to the university is financially able

It is, from all angles, nothing short of a masterpiece. The new financial aid plan ensures that every student's financial need will be met without the use of need-based loans. This means scholarships, work-study earnings, federal grants and Vanderbilt's own institutional grants will fulfill the need as necessary.

What does this do for current Vanderbilt students? It means that beginning next fall (spring semester for graduating seniors) student needbased loans from Vanderbilt are a thing of the past and the university itself will make up the cost. The removal of this burden will provide students a chance to leave college with fewer loans to pay back upon entering the workforce.

What about the benefits for future students? This new initiative broadens the pool for the potential Class of 2013 and thereafter. While lower- and middle-income students before have had to make the difficult decision of whether to take out needbased loans in order to attend, this concern will be essentially non-existent. This translates into more accessibility for those students who would otherwise choose to attend public schools with lower costs due to lower in-state tuition and statefunded scholarships.

What about the benefits for Vanderbilt as an institution? Ultimately, the university gains from this opening up of its doors. Because every student admitted will have the ability to attend, Vanderbilt will choose its freshman classes based on academic ability. None of the best students who wish to attend will be turned away for financial reasons, and as admission standards continue

to increase, this will only result in increasingly better freshmen classes. This, in turn, results in a more prestigious degree for Vanderbilt graduates

The university will promote this plan as a means for achieving racial, geographic and income level diversity. The plan, without a doubt, will reach these goals, as it will both provide access to groups that could not otherwise afford tuition, as well as begin to deconstruct stereotypes of Vanderbilt as an "all white, all Southern, all rich" university.

These are, however, superficial reasons to support the new plan. The "no need-based loans" initiative is not an affirmative action plan, and all Vanderbilt students should hope it never becomes such. The students of minority racial and geographic groups whose numbers will increase will be top students among other top students at Vanderbilt, not quota fillers. This will both increase the prestige of the university as well as providing a quality and deserved education to those who need it most.

Does the plan have potential for problems in the decades to come? There are questions about how this approach to financial aid will affect how families perceive saving money for higher education. Will the incentive for middle-income families to save disappear in future generations, as the option of the university picking up the bill seems so readily available to lower-income families? In this worst of consequences, we may see some of these students in the next generation unable to pay for a Vanderbilt education.

These issues notwithstanding, students, families, faculty and administrators should all praise Chancellor Nick Zeppos and Provost Richard McCarty for their leadership on this initiative to improve the financial situations of current and future students. Our university and our degrees will be better off for their efforts.

# More guns, no solutions


Wednesday's editorial "Vandy students need guns" represents a new low in Hustler editorial content in the few years I've been here. I imagine some Vanderbilt veterans have rarely seen worse in careers much longer than mine.

I was a tour guide during my undergraduate years here, and the tours I led after the Virginia Tech tragedy certainly saw an increase in safetyrelated questions from prospective students and their parents. I confess that my thorough descriptions of Vandy Vans, walking escorts and AlertVU to these visitors likely failed to be the reactionary heroism we so often crave when faced with tragedy. But there is not an ounce of me that would rather have told these students and

parents that our response had been to seek eased restrictions on gun availability for members of the Vanderbilt community.

We are students on a campus where shots were fired in a residence hall three years ago. Our nation and world are still reeling, a year and a half later, from the unbelievable events at Virginia Tech. In the wake of these tragedies (and others like them), I am astounded and confused by the belief that guns are, in fact, part of the solution. That bright students at a leading university would publish an editorial affirming this belief is equally

# Pay inequity still needs to be resolved

On the surface, women seem to be doing

pretty well in the United States. Hillary Clinton almost won the presidential nomination, and Sarah Palin could become the first female vicepresident. Despite the advances women have made in the political arena, inequality between the sexes still exists in terms of equal pay for

Many people might be surprised to learn that pay inequity still exists in the U.S. According to the National Committee on Pay Equity, for the same work, women only make 77.8 percent of what men make. In terms of actual earnings, men make an average of \$45,113 while women earn \$35,102 — a difference of \$10,000.

The above statistics hold true for all women, regardless of their backgrounds. Pay inequity actually increases as a woman's level of education increases. Within a lifetime, women with high school diplomas will earn \$700,000 less than men, while those with college degrees will make \$1.2 million less than their male counterparts. This number jumps to \$2 million if the woman is a professional school graduate.

These statistics represent a very slow closing of the gap between men's and women's wages. In 1963, when the Equal Pay Act became law, women could only expect to earn 59 percent of what men earned. In over 40 years, women's pay has only increased by about 20 percent, which translates into about half a percent increase annually. This is pathetic, especially considering the fact that the U.S. is one of the richest nations in the world.

In addition to being (technically) against the law, pay inequity obviously affects women's lives very negatively. Though women make less money than men for the same work, they still have to pay the same prices for goods and services. Because of this sad truth, women, especially single mothers, are hit the hardest when the economy does poorly.

Also, pay inequity can put women's futures in danger. As the National Organization for Women notes, pay inequity "penalizes (women's) retirement security by creating gaps in social security and pensions."

Workplaces have obviously dragged their feet in reversing discriminative practices, and the government hasn't done much to speed up the process either. A recent study conducted by the General Accounting Office at the request of three Democratic congressmen confirms the **Equal Employment Opportunity Commission** and the Department of Labor's Office of Federal Contract Compliances, two federal agencies responsible for enforcing the Equal Pay Act, fail to ensure pay equity. While the agencies may take the initial steps to ensure equal pay, they fail to monitor progress in their investigations and do not fact-check the self-evaluating documents contractors provide them about salary policies.

While the government may have provided the framework to ensure pay equity, if it does not enforce its own policies, then the framework is useless. Apparently, correcting pay inequity based on gender is not one of our nation's top priorities, though it should be. It's embarrassing the American government demands equal rights for women in other countries but fails to fully provide them to American women.

There's really no easy solution to the problem. It's impossible to ensure that every employer in the country pays employees equally regardless of gender, and discriminative policies cannot change overnight. However, I think the government could make a little more effort to correct the problem of pay inequity.

In high school there was definitely a group of kids who drank, but I never




Ultimately, the decision to not drink is extremely valid and to respect the decision requires a deeper understanding of the social implications of drinking.







# Vanderbilt stays grounded, focused on beating Tigers

With **ESPN** "College GameDay" coming to town, any Vanderbilt fan will tell you Saturday's game against No. 13 Auburn (3-1, 1-1 Southeastern Conference) is more than just a regular season game.

Talk to a player on the team, though, and you might get a different answer.

"It's another tough game, and that's how we look at it. We just have to play football, regardless of who is or isn't watching," said senior safety Reshard Langford.

His teammate senior receiver Sean Walker agrees.

"Corso will pick us as the underdog or the winner, and it doesn't matter to us," Walker said. "It's nice to get respect as a team, but we never worry about what other people think."

It's this attitude — treating every day like "GameDay" that has earned Vanderbilt a spot in the top 25 for the second time in 50 years. The constant high level of focus is why Vanderbilt remains undefeated and, more importantly, why the No. 19 Commodores (4-0, 2-0 SEC) aren't letting the national hype get to their heads.

"Everybody's focused, and that's a great thing to have on film keeps us grounded,"

a team," Langford said. "Just working hard all the time keeps us level headed."

In addition to focus, the Commodores will play with a sense of redemption against the Tigers after last year's 35-7 loss in Auburn. Vanderbilt coach Bobby Johnson knows memories from last year's game will keep his players motivated.

"Showing last year's Auburn

Johnson said. "They sort of took Smith, the team's most us to the woodshed. Our guys know what we have to do to

beat Auburn, Commodores will once again rely on a stingy defense that has allowed only 10 secondhalf points all year. The Tigers have struggled in the passing game, but preseason All-SEC running back Ben Tate has kept opposing defenses honest with 393 rushing yards. Johnson believes an aggressive defensive scheme will be vital to stopping the Tigers on offense.

"Our defensive staff has does a fantastic job of being aggressive, and it's a mindset of ours now," Johnson said. "We'll be aggressive no matter what the other team does, and when it happens we've got opportunities to make big

The offense will look to build off of an unspectacular, yet efficient effort against Ole Miss. Thanks to last weekend's bye, the Commodores were able to rest some injured players, most notably starting quarterback redshirt senior Chris Nickson and senior captain George Smith. Nickson left the game against the Rebels with a shoulder injury but will start against Auburn on Saturday.

experienced wide receiver, will return after injuring his foot during summer camp.

Johnson said he thinks Smith's contributions will be felt both on the field and on the sidelines.

"Having George back, his personality, his leadership, it will definitely be a big boost for us," Johnson said. "He's a good player — he's tall, he can run, he can catch, and that puts pressure on anybody's team. Hopefully we'll get him out there and get him back in the swing of things."

With a healthier team and a national audience watching, the Commodores are poised for a hard-nosed, exciting game on Saturday. Though the players and coaches insist "GameDay's" presence doesn't affect their preparation or focus, they do recognize the importance of the recognition to the Vanderbilt faithful.

"'GameDay' is a big part of college football — it's a part of any football fan's Saturday," said senior kicker and Nashville native Bryant Hahnfeldt, who has yet to miss a field goal this

"Having it here in Nashville is a really special thing. We won't take it for granted." ■

**VANDERBILT HUSTLER:** You guys are coming off a pretty solid performance at the Southern Intercollegiates. Were you guys happy with the outcomes?


