### 1 Rice says Arab nations should reach out to Israel to nudge Mideast peace accord

**RIYADH, Saudi Arabia** — Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said Tuesday that Arab nations must do more to reach out to Israel, as a way to do their part to nudge a Mideast peace accord into being, The Associated Press reported.

She stepped gingerly around the question of whether the outreach should include Arab countries establishing diplomatic relations with Israel, their historical enemy. The only Arab nations that now have relations with Israel are Jordan and Egypt.

### 2 NTSB finds design flaw caused Minneapolis bridge collapse

**WASHINGTON** — Undersized gusset plates in the Interstate 35-W bridge in Minneapolis were "the critical factor" in the bridge collapse last year that killed 13 people and injured 100, the National Transportation Safety Board said Tuesday.

According to The Associated Press, Chairman Mark Rosenker said the plates, which connected steel beams, were roughly half the thickness they should have been because of a design error. Investigators found 16 fractured gusset plates from the bridge's center span, he said.

### 3 Explosion in Beirut targets U.S. Embassy vehicle; at least 3 Lebanese killed

**BEIRUT, Lebanon** — An explosion targeted a U.S. Embassy vehicle Tuesday in northern Beirut, killing at least three Lebanese and injuring an American bystander and a local embassy employee, U.S. and Lebanese officials said.

The blast, which damaged the armored SUV and several other vehicles, took place just ahead of a farewell reception for the American ambassador at a hotel in central Beirut, according to The Associated Press.

No Americans were in the car, which was carrying two Lebanese employees of the embassy, State Department spokesman Sean McCormack said.

### 4 Selig says Giants should have reported Bonds' trainer; Congress calls for Tejada probe

**WASHINGTON** — Barry Bonds' team should have reported concerns about the home run king's personal trainer to Major League Baseball, commissioner Bud Selig told Congress on Tuesday during a hearing on the sport's steroids era.

Even though no players were present, unlike the theatrical March 2005 session, the names of Bonds, seven-time Cy Young Award winner Roger Clemens and 2002 AL MVP Miguel Tejada all were raised during the four-hour, 15-minute proceedings prompted by last month's Mitchell Report, The Associated Press reported.

### 5 Apple CEO reveals tiny new laptop, confirms iTunes movie rentals

**SAN FRANCISCO** — Apple Inc. Chief Executive Steve Jobs took the wraps off a super-slim new laptop at the Macworld trade show on Tuesday, unveiling a personal computer less than an inch thick that turns on the moment it's opened, The Associated Press reported.

Jobs also confirmed the consumer electronics company's foray into online movie rentals, revealing an alliance with all six major movie studios to offer films over high-speed Internet connections within 30 days after they're released on DVD.

### 6 FDA says cloned animals are safe for food, sales won't begin quite yet

**WASHINGTON** — Meat and milk from cloned animals is as safe as that from their counterparts bred the old-fashioned way, the Food and Drug Administration said Tuesday — but sales still won't begin right away.

The decision removes the last big U.S. regulatory hurdle to marketing products from cloned livestock and puts the FDA in concert with recent safety assessments from European food regulators and several other nations, The Associated Press reported.

### 7 Tick bite scare of '06 leads to talk of an elected Lt. Gov.

**NASHVILLE, Tenn.** — A tick bite may cause Tennessee to start having an elected lieutenant governor, The Tennessean reported.

An advisory panel submitted its final report to Gov. Phil Bredesen Monday on amending the constitution to establish a clear process if a governor became incapacitated. But constitutional problems that have arisen may complicate the issue.

To address those complications, Bredesen is considering having an elected lieutenant governor. That new position may run on the same ticket as a governor or prospective governor seeking the office.

### 8 Oprah Winfrey partnering with Discovery for own TV network

**NEW YORK** — Oprah Winfrey is getting her own TV network.

OWN — for Oprah Winfrey Network — will debut next year in nearly 70 million homes with cable and satellite, part of a deal announced Tuesday with Discovery Communications, The Associated Press reported. It will replace the Discovery Health network.

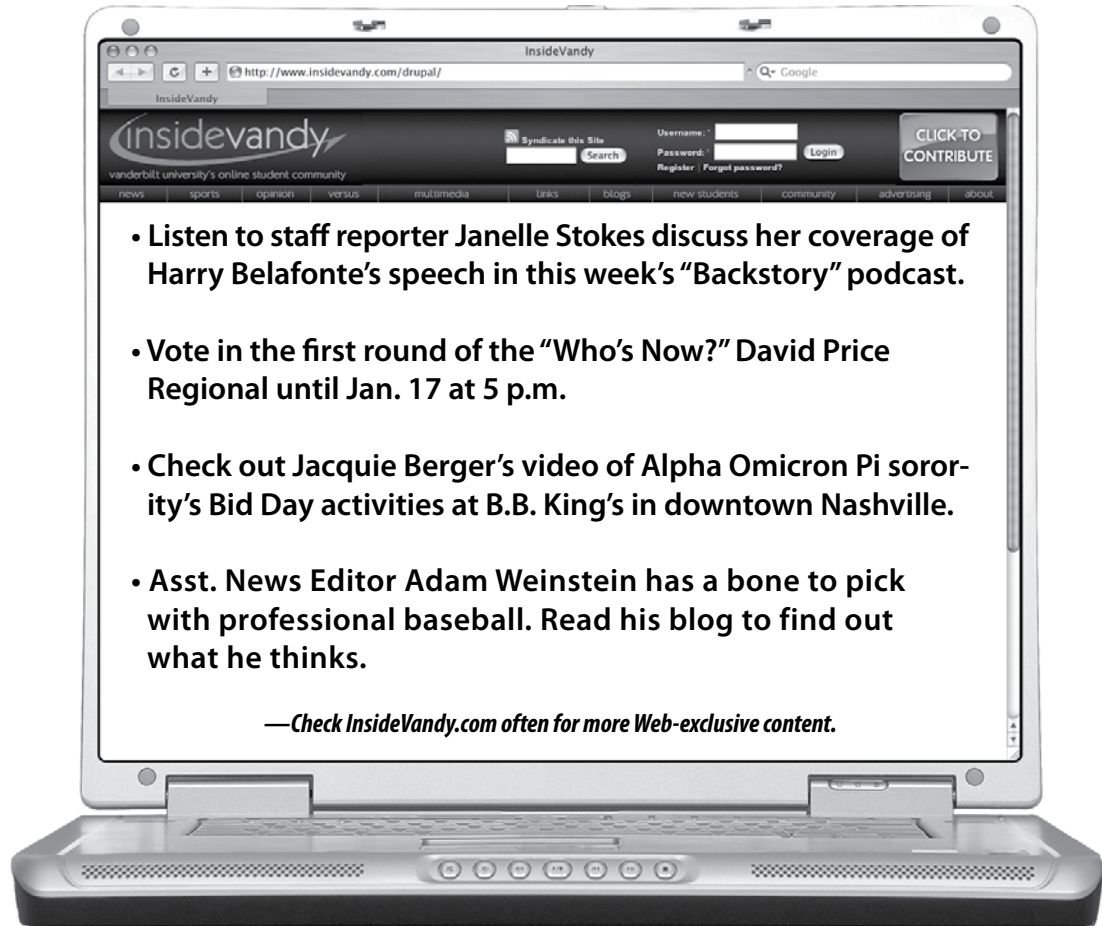
The announcement builds a media empire that already includes the top-rated TV talk show, a magazine, a satellite radio network, a Web site and TV movies made under her banner.

### 9 Vanderbilt Law School appoints new registrar, academic programs director

**NASHVILLE, Tenn.** — Donna L. Pavlick has been named director of academic programs and registrar of the Vanderbilt Law School, Vanderbilt News Service reported.

"Donna will play a key leadership role working with faculty and other senior administrators to implement and manage our rich array of academic programs. She also will work closely with Vanderbilt Law students, providing academic support, guidance and advice," said Chris Guthrie, associate dean for academic affairs.

# Belafonte challenges youth in commemoration of King Jr

Activist expresses his opinions on the future, politics.

He said we should become firemen — in the figurative sense, of course.

Controversial activist Harry Belafonte kicked off the 2008 Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Series, themed “Connecting Generations: Take A Stand,” on Monday, speaking to an audience full of students, faculty and members of the Nashville community.

A close ally and companion of King during the civil rights movement, Belafonte characterized his relationship to King as being “central to all that I do.”

Belafonte, who is widely known for his career as a singer, producer and social and political activist, said he is motivated by King’s prophecy of a far-from-perfect American culture, despite the promises of integration.

King believed the situation he faced in the 1960s forced black citizens to “integrate into a burning house,” and said in response, “We’ve got to become firemen.”

Opting for a question-and-answer forum instead of delivering a traditional speech, Belafonte examined the role of the artist in politics and society.

“Opening up discussion is what I do around this country,” Belafonte said. He drew upon his recent work with gangs in South Central Los Angeles.

“The men involved in the gang culture are activists trying to bring non-violence to the community,” said Belafonte, who guides them to “pick up the baton” from their predecessors. “They’re learning

brick-by-brick that a quick fix doesn’t work.”

Regarding politics, Belafonte commented on some of the presidential candidates.

“I am thrilled about Barack Obama,” Belafonte said. “From the perspective of color, I’m a pig turned loose from the pen.”

At the same time, he expressed his reservations about the Democratic candidate, recalling his 2002 criticism of the Bush administration, Condoleezza Rice and Colin Powell.

“From the perspective of the human condition and world at large ... I don’t know who he is,” he said. “His avoidance of specificity disturbs me. ... (I don’t want to be) caught in the trick bag of color like with Rice and Powell, who turned out to be tyrants.”

Larry Rivers, a graduate student, found it more than fitting for Belafonte to be the keynote speaker of the series.

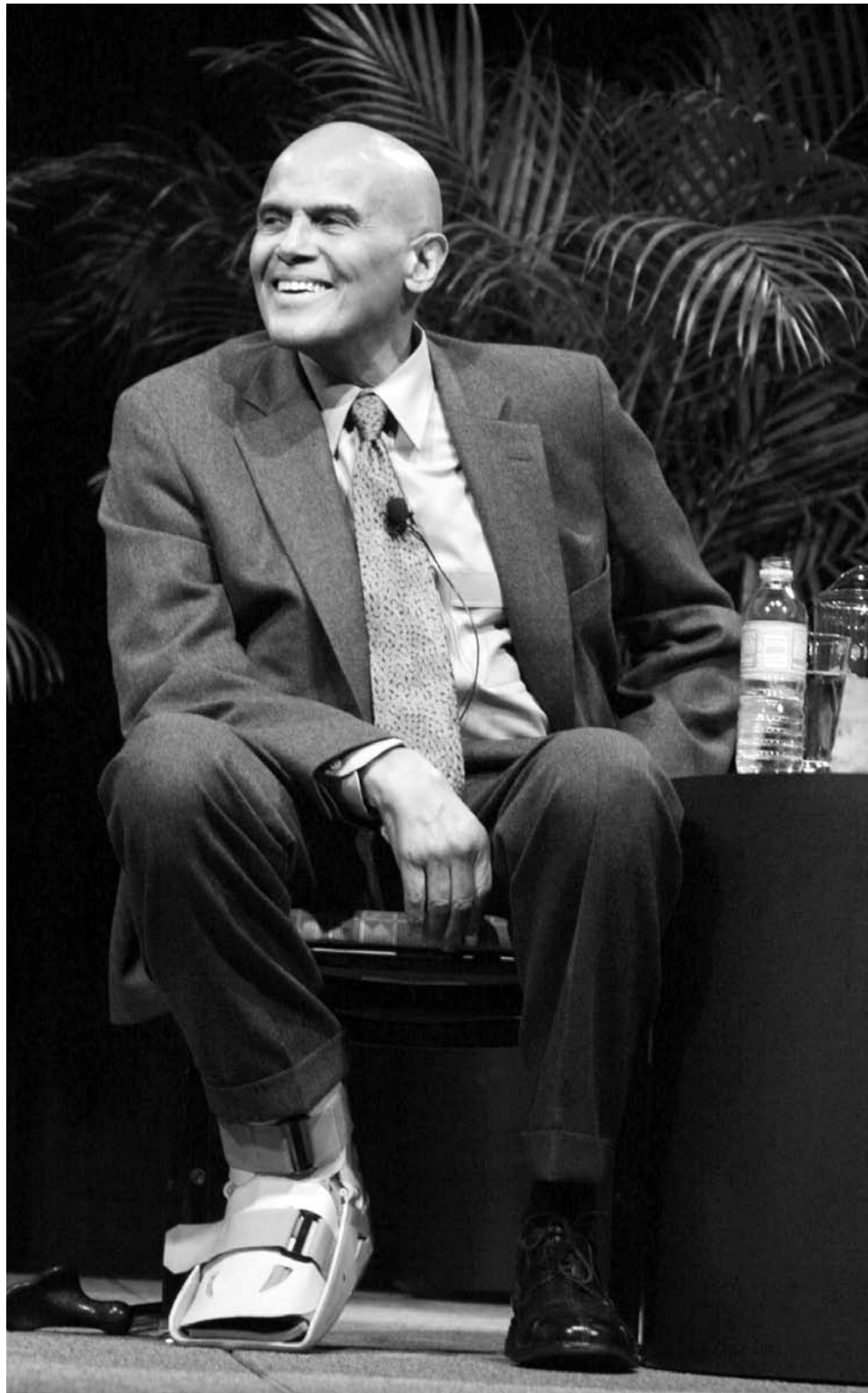
“The university is a market for ideas,” Rivers said. “(He) is here to better America, opinions, and people.”

After taking a few questions from the audience, Belafonte ended the evening with a challenge.

“(I encourage) young people in America to be as engaged as they can be (and to) believe in other promises than what they’ve been given. There’s more to life than a bank account,” Belafonte said. “How are you going to become firemen?” ■

Review,” Newell said. “We are broadening our short stories, poetry, haikus and photo essays, and some of the pieces may end up in The Review, but we are not partnering with them.”

The same idea applies to Versus’s affiliation with The Vanderbilt Hustler, she continued.

“Versus and The Hustler have an amicable relationship, and we are going to share a printer and some staff, but we’re not under the same leadership,” she said.

Many of Versus’ specialties will continue to be published in the reconstructed magazine and on the Web.

“Versus has always had strong photo essays,” Newell said, “but we had to sacrifice the glossy paper. Because of that, we are going to focus on creating them for our online readership with InsideVandy.”

Both Gearing and Newell hope the refocused Versus will have more success and an increased readership.

“I also saw a lack of focus on arts and culture and weekly analysis of it,” Gearing said. “I think this is an exciting opportunity to give Versus the chance to rebirth into something successful.” ■

## MICHIGAN GOP: Candidates focus on upcoming primary in SC

“It’s a victory of optimism over Washington-style pessimism,” Romney said in an Associated Press telephone interview from Southfield, Mich., echoing his campaign speeches and taking a poke at McCain, the four-term senator he beat. “Now on to South Carolina, Nevada, Florida.”

Minimizing the significance of Tuesday’s vote, McCain said he had called Romney to congratulate him “that Michigan welcomed their native son with their support.”

“Starting tomorrow, we’re going to win South Carolina, and we’re going to go on and win the nomination,” McCain declared, also in an AP interview from Charleston, S.C.

Huckabee, too, already campaigning in the next primary state, said in Lexington, S.C.: “We’re going to win South Carolina. We put a flag in the ground here Saturday.” He also jabbed at Romney, who has poured at least \$20 million of his personal fortune into his bid: “We need to prove that electing a president is not just about how much money a candidate has.”

Though he now has come in third in New Hampshire and Michigan after winning in Iowa, Huckabee said, “Whatever it takes, we’re in it for the long haul.”

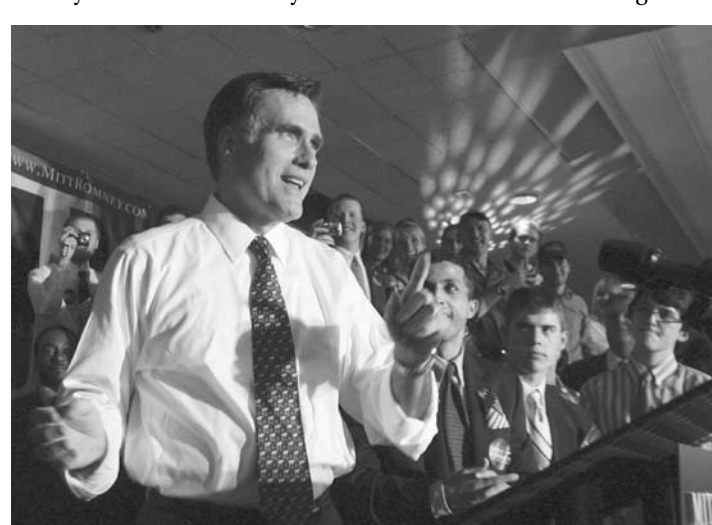
In Michigan, with 37 percent of precincts reporting, Romney had 39.4 percent of the vote, McCain had 30 percent and Huckabee 15.4 percent. No other Republican fared better than single digits.

Hillary Rodham Clinton was the only top contender on the Democratic ballot. With 43 percent of precincts

counted, she had 58.7 percent of the vote to 35.9 percent for uncommitted delegates to the Democratic National Convention.

Romney’s ties to Michigan proved beneficial.

Four in 10 voters said his roots factored into their votes, and more than half of that group backed Romney, according to preliminary results from surveys of voters as they left

their polling places, taken for The AP and the networks. He also led among voters who said the economy and illegal immigration were their most important issues, and won a majority of Republicans, conservatives, and voters looking for a candidate with experience.

McCain had an edge with those who wanted an authentic president, and he won among moderates, independents and Democrats. But fewer non-Republican voters participated in the GOP primary this year than in 2000 when those voters helped him beat George W. Bush. Independents and Democrats accounted for roughly one-

third of the vote, compared with about one half eight years ago.

Romney had a slight edge over McCain as the candidate likeliest to bring needed change.

The economy proved the most important issue for Republicans in Michigan, the state with the highest unemployment rate in the nation and an ailing auto

weakened by searing losses in Iowa and New Hampshire. He was the only one who watched the voting returns in Michigan; his top Michigan opponents, McCain and Huckabee, campaigned in the state earlier in the day but left by afternoon to plant themselves in next-up South Carolina.

Up for grabs in Michigan were 30 Republican delegates. Romney campaigned in the state far more than his rivals and spent more than \$2 million in TV ads in Michigan, nearly three times what McCain did, according to an analysis of presidential advertising by the nonpartisan Michigan Campaign Finance Network. McCain paid for more than \$740,000 in ads and Huckabee spent more than \$480,000.

A muddle from the start, the GOP race has grown ever more fluid as the first states voted over the past two weeks. Huckabee won the Iowa caucuses, McCain prevailed in New Hampshire’s primary, and Romney was second to both — but claimed victory in scarcely contested Wyoming. Thompson is camping out in South Carolina looking for his first win. Rudy Giuliani, the former New York mayor, is doing the same in Florida, which votes Jan. 29.

Romney was born and raised in Michigan, and his late father, George, was head of American Motors and a three-term governor in the 1960s. Romney announced his presidential candidacy in Michigan a year ago, campaigned in it far more than his rivals and spent considerably more money on advertising. ■

# Promotion of human rights in China just a false promise

When the Chinese announced their bid for the 2008 Olympic Games, they promised to promote the development of human rights in their country. Now, with only seven months until the Games in Beijing commence, the rest of the world is beginning to suspect their promise was solely fabricated to improve their chances for the candidacy and not for advancing causes of human dignity, as they had promised.

In fact, we have the right to feel deceived because China, in utter rejection of its own vows and continued defiance of international criticism, has virtually accomplished nothing on the issues of religious freedom, media censorship, climate change, forced abortions, capital punishments, rights of ethnic minorities, LGBT equality and treatment of AIDS/HIV patients. Rather, China has descended into a new nadir by sacrificing a host of human rights just to showcase its economic prosperity, political solidarity and social harmony.

One of the most disturbing human rights abuses directly associated with the Olympics preparation involved the inhumane exploitation of labor. Investigations from Playfair, an international coalition of trade unions, revealed that Chinese Olympic firms have hired companies like "Lekit," a Taiwanese corporation that forced children to work up to 13 hours a day in order to maximize productivity. Other reports indicate similar companies allow workers to operate in substandard conditions and in harsh working environments conducive to fatal accidents. The exploitation of workers' rights had been increasing due to China's rapid industrialization, and the government's decision to ignore the plight of its own citizens during the Olympics

preparation worsened this socioeconomic injustice.

Unfortunately, these troubling reports of labor exploitation were heavily censored in China as the authorities have recently intensified their grip on the media and dissident groups. In order to boast to the world its social coherence and ideological uniformity during the Olympics, the government has decided to mute dissent and avoid embarrassing demonstrations by detaining journalists and political activists under charges of subversion and pseudo-terrorism. Hu Jia was one of the many dissidents recently arrested due to the nature of his work. As a lifelong activist for HIV/AIDS causes and environmental issues, he has fought tirelessly for democratic reforms, better health care and sustainable development, and his efforts caught the attention of both the Chinese authorities and international human rights agencies. Realizing that he posed a serious threat to political stability during the Games, the government placed Jia under house arrest and constant surveillance. Unfortunately, his story is just one of many that point to China's shameless disregard for human dignity.

It is not surprising China has decided to ignore the human rights issues of today. However, as China continues to become an important member of the global society, the Chinese government must be held accountable for their empty rhetoric and oppressive policies. The world must warn China its human rights abuses are no longer acceptable, and this year's Olympics represents an opportunity to make this message clear and strong.

Notably, in response to criticism from prominent Olympics organizers, China has successfully urged the Sudanese government to allow the United Nations Peacekeeping Forces to operate in Darfur. Although there is much work to be done

regarding China's role in Darfur, this small progress provides a glimpse of hope that China will react to foreign pressure in order to preserve its status as the host for the 2008 Olympics. However, this hope must remain grounded in the reality of China's calculating nature and its dogmatic resistance to change.
