I'm one of Ray-J's 'homies' in this week's

episode. I kinda got to know him through doing this music thing. I think this year we might be able to put together a fun show, hopefully about me making this rap album and going around causing a lot of trouble. So, yeah, let's set the record straight on that.

VM: I'll gladly be the one to dispel all the rumors. If you could battle rap any rapper in the game today, who would you take on?

TG: Well, you know, I don't really like to go battling rappers. I try to keep it sort of positive. There is this funny video that I did on my website, that people put on YouTube and they made it seem like it was a battle, but we were just rapping together. If you go on YouTube, you can click in "Tom Green freestyle battle with Xzibit." I rapped with Flava Flav once on my show, and Jurassic 5 and a bunch of people. Too Short. I'm not really going out there trying to say I'm the best rapper in the world or anything like

that. That'd be kind of odd, being a goofball Canadian from Ottawa.

VM: How has being Canadian helped your comedy remain different from that of your contemporaries?





Versus Magazine: How did you get into hip-hop?

DreKidd: Man, you want the long version or the short version? My brother used to rap, and he is fifteen years older than me. My father was not around, and my brother, given our age difference, was kind of a father figure to me. He was into a certain type of hip-hop (A Tribe Called Quest, Pharcyde type stuff), but he also liked NWA, Tupac. I was exposed to a lot. Every day [I'd] wake up and either Chuck D or Fatlip from Pharcyde [was] blasting. So, as far back as I can remember I have been into hip-hop. But in terms of actually perusing it myself, it took getting inspired from all my homeboys. I'd be the type to have arguments like, "What is real hip-hop?" Listening to somebody like Gucci Mane, and be like, "This ain't real hip-hop." From these arguments they knew I was deep into hiphop and would rap every day in the cyphers. They were like, "If you love [it] so much, why don't you get in the game yourself, and you can make the change?" That got me motivated to come back to L.A., start attacking shows and get into the studio.

VM: You said your brother was a kind father figure to you; You talk about that a little on your track "You Made Your Choice." What was the motivation behind that song?

Drekidd: It is basically about people making their choices, making decisions without being mindful of the outcome for the future. Just a little background from my situation, my father actually was a music mogul through the '70s and '80s. He made a lot of money through the success of The Gap Band [a multi-platinum R&B group.] For those who don't know, that's Charlie Wilson, he is on Snoop's tracks a lot, "Uncle Charlie." So, he made his fortune during that time, and he had a lot of kids with a lot of models. My mom was one of those models. He didn't really do the right thing with me, taking care of his seed. In that situation, you have take up your responsibility. The song is talking about people who drop the ball on their responsibilities. That happens all too often in the neighborhoods that I am familiar with. I wanted to shed light on that, and take a little time to throw a middle finger up to my father real quick. It's not to be ultra disrespectful, but I wanted to get it out there and vent. I think that's what the music is for, right?

VM: The title of the mixtape, "The Fix," what does it mean?

DreKidd: It started out as a joke with my friends, 'cause everyone on the West Coast has been waiting for [Dr Dre's] "Detox," and it keeps on getting pushed back. We got these "fiends" out here who are craving music, so what'd we do? We dropped "The Fix." That's not say it is in the same vein as Dr Dre's music, but just something to hold people over.

VM: On "The Fix," the title track of the album, you use a sample from Eric Clapton's song "Layla." Heartbeat did the producing for the album; had you ever listened to Eric Clapton before you put track together that track?

DreKidd: Oh yeah, we both have a pretty extensive knowledge of music. I listen to a lot of stuff you probably wouldn't even think I would come across. Sergio [Heartbeat] texted me to tell me that he had this fresh beat, so I'm like, "All right, let me listen to it," and it was crazy. We went straight to the studio with that one. Just put the bars over that. I had more stuff, too. I could've rapped over that for five minutes. I love the way he did it with Eric Clapton's joint. #



The Strokes are back!?

When I first heard "11th


Dimension," off Strokes frontman Julian Casablancas' debut solo album "Phrazes for the Young," I really liked it. It's fun — great stuff to jam to while ellipticalling your ass off at the gym. Then, I heard "River of Brakelights," which is also pretty good – catchy, edgy, cool. Yet, after listening to the album in full, I quickly realized there is a fundamental element missing to Casablancas' music — other than the rest of the Strokes. Ultimately, his music lacks the raw blood, sweat and tears sound that we all crave — it is missing the passion, and, well, the booze. Casablancas acknowledges this is in the weird, slowmoving "Ludlow Street:" "Everything seems to go wrong when I stop drinking." And I have to agree, there is something very wrong with some of the songs in this

album. Rather than drink himself to death, Casablancas is trying to find himself after years of wandering. This is evident in "11th Dimension:" "I've got a mind full of blanks/ I've got to go somewhere fast." However, even though he's trying to get out of an obvious rut, the anxiety inherent in his lyrics weakens the sound. Now solo, there is such a tangible sense of self consciousness to his music, a need to prove something. This goes against the listlessyet-soulful Casablancas we loved during the Strokes

mania — in the end, what

could you love more than this too-cool-to-care hipster performing live? Back when he was the face of the Strokes, Casablancas would fall on his ass and not give a shit; now it seems he's trying to experiment with the sounds of today's electro-obsessed age because he feels like he's supposed to (and which he clearly fails at — see: cheesy electronic keyboard tune in "Left & Right in the Dark").

But, give him a break - the guy is married, and becoming a dad. At least he's still got that super sexy voice. For now, I think I'll stick exclusively to "11th Dimension" ... and wait for a better second album (cross your fingers!) ... Or for the Strokes to come back (double cross your fingers!). #

heartbeat alive. #




