# Record number of groups receive AcFee

Activities fee funding was heavily contested this year, with a record 160 student organizations applying for the nearly \$1.6 million AcFee fund. The Student Finance

Committee allocated funds to almost all of the groups, with 158 receiving funding.

The spike in the number of groups awarded funding was due in part to the number of new organizations that applied — 40 new groups applied, and 38 received some

portion of their requested amount.

Student Finance Committee Chair Rachna Patel said the only two groups not funded — Invisible Children and Youth for Western Civilization — did not receive any awards

# Peabody ranked No. 1 graduate education school

For the second consecutive year, Peabody College of Education and Human Development has been named the No. 1 graduate school for education by the U.S. News and World Report. But what's different about this year's accomplishment is the margin by which Peabody is outpacing its competitors.

Kurt Brobeck, the director of communications for Peabody, said the college's perfect score of 100 is not significant because the top-rated school automatically gets this score. What is important is the score of the No. 2 school — Teachers College at Columbia University in New York, N.Y. — 91.

"The gap between the No. 1 spot and the No. 2 spot is nine points, which is really pretty incredible," Brobeck said. "Usually you wouldn't have a gap that is that large."

Last year, the difference between first and second was four points, and again Peabody had a score of 100.

Camilla Benbow, the Patricia and Rodes Hart Dean of Education and Human Development, sent The Hustler a statement and said she and the school were thrilled to retain the number one ranking. She was out of town testifying before Congress "on the role that schools of education, like Peabody, play in ensuring that all students have great teachers and great school leaders," according to the university.

"It reflects the quality of our faculty, the talent of our students and the work we are

doing to strengthen education and human development. It also challenges us to deepen our engagement with critical issues, and we look forward to doing that."

According to the U.S. News and World Report Web site, the formula used to determine this ranking weighs the following: Quality is worth 40 percent, student selectivity is 18 percent, faculty resources is 12 percent, and research activity is 30 percent. They surveyed 278 programs during fall 2009 and early 2010 for peer evaluations of individual programs.

Peabody's specialized programs also saw improved ratings, including administration/supervision and special education ranked as first in the nation. Education policy improved from a five rating to a four, higher education administration improved from an eight to a six.

Brobeck said because these ratings are determined by peer evaluations, Peabody's prestige must be rising among other education schools.

"I think what's going on is a recognition on the part of other education school deans that the quality is here," he said. "So they're seeing a gradual building of quality and quality of students here and are saying to their peers, 'Wow, something really exciting is happening at Peabody.'"

This ranking does a number of things to continue to improve Peabody's status, not only to the education community but also internally for students and faculty. There's a domino effect going

on that "just ratchets things up another level," he said.

"(Faculty) are rewarded psychologically by being associated with a school of this caliber, and it helps us recruit new faculty," he said. "It has the effect of increasing

the number of people who are interesting in coming to Peabody, increasing the quality of our applicants, so we see higher scores year after year, and that enables us to be more selective in our admissions." ■

# Engineers allowed to select laptops

Changes made last fall to the School of Engineering's TransIT laptop computer program will continue next year, with students being given the option to bring their own computer rather than being required to purchase a laptop from the school.

In previous years, engineering students were required to purchase Dell laptops through the university. However, starting with the Class of 2013, students have the option of purchasing university-issued computers or selecting another brand or model of their choice.

"At one time, we did this because the market was changing quickly," said Ken Debelak, director of information technology for the School of Engineering. "But as technology changed and things mature, we decided to set a minimum specification and allow people the choice of what platform they wanted."

Students can purchase any type of laptop as long as it meets certain School of Engineering specifications. Because the School of Engineering's software runs on Microsoft Windows Vista or Windows 7, they require that students either purchase a PC with this operating system or install it on a Mac.

Because all students in past years were issued Dell laptops, the School of Engineering has operated a service center with Dell-authorized technicians in Featheringill Hall to ensure fast repairs when necessary. Under the new system, students are encouraged — but not required — to purchase on-site service plans.

Moving forward, these technicians will focus more on software issues, according to Debelak. TransIT continues to provide software and software support to students. Portions of students' lab fees each semester go to purchase licensing for lab-specific programs, which can be downloaded from servers in Featheringill.

With the university-issued Dell computers, students are responsible for contacting Dell if any damage takes place. Through their accidental insurance policy, Dell will cover the cost of repair, but if they determine if the computer was intentionally damaged, it will be the student's responsibility to pay for the repair or another computer. ■

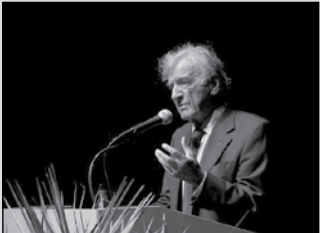
## Vanderbilt named 52nd 'happiest' university

About a week ago, The Daily Beast ranked Vanderbilt University as the 7th most stressful university, now in a new ranking it names Vanderbilt the 52nd happiest university.

The Daily Beast considered 149 schools for the list, with 100 making the cut. The 149 schools included the top 50 public universities, the top 50 liberal arts colleges and the top 50 national universities.

To determine the level of each school's "happiness," according to The Daily Beast Web site, the following criteria were weighed equally: campus housing, nightlife, average graduate indebtedness, average freshman retention rate, campus dining, number of student clubs and organizations and daylight hours that are sunny.



## Students react to Elie Wiesel lecture

Addressing a sold-out crowd in Langford Auditorium, Holocaust survivor Dr. Elie Wiesel delivered a lecture Monday evening titled "Civility and Justice for Whom?" in which he stressed the commonalities among all peoples.

"There is something that links each person and that link is a spark of God, if you believe in God. And if not, a spark of humanity, for you must believe in something," Wiesel said in his lecture. "Whatever happened to one people, happened to others as well, in different ways, on different levels."

Sponsored by Vanderbilt Hillel and the Office of Religious Life, Wiesel's lecture was the culmination of Project Dialogue, a yearlong program that aims to engage the university community in active dialogue and to connect classroom learning to real-world issues.

A survivor of Auschwitz and Buchenwald concentration camps, Wiesel has devoted his life to defending human rights around the world. He received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986 and the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1992 for his humanitarian work. The author of more than 50 books, he is best known for his memoir entitled Night, a moving account of his experiences during the Holocaust.

# ACTIVITY FEE: Programming receives bulk of funding

because they were not AcFee-eligible, either because they did not adequately demonstrate need or because they were a political organization.

Patel credited the number of new groups applying for funding to an increase in the number of organizations created this year.

"A lot of new organizations sprang up, especially service organizations — that tends to be our main area," she said. "People come up with great

ideas and register and are AcFee-eligible, so they choose to apply."

Generally, the new organizations receive less funding than more established groups. The 38 newly funded organizations were awarded 1.99 percent of the total AcFee fund, with a majority receiving less than \$1,000. Patel said this is to ensure that activities fee funding is spent carefully and that the group will appeal to a wide group of students.

"When we look at brand-

new organizations, we cannot give them their full funding. They are brand new; they have no track record with us. Even though they might look great on paper and interview very well, we don't know how successful their events are going to be," she said.

The top 10 largest recipients, garnering 70.53 percent of the total funding, are primarily programming organizations, such as Music Group, the highest funded organization with \$475,000.

"Thousands of students go to these events. They bring in huge acts and big-name people. They need the money to put on these events. They appeal to all students," Patel said. "Because they do that, it's important that we give them this money."

The SFC, divided into five sub-committees, evaluates groups based on applications and an interview process every year to determine how to most effectively distribute the fund, generated from the

activity fee each student pays every year — this year, \$946. In order to be eligible, groups must demonstrate a broad campus appeal and must enhance the overall student experience.

Even if groups do not receive funding in the original round of allocations, whether because they did not apply or were not deemed eligible, any group is able to apply for allocations from a contingency fund throughout the year. This continual help

in funding serves to ensure AcFee's purpose, according to Patel.

"The purpose of AcFee is to fund those organizations that are successful every year and are able to help students get engaged with campus life. To put on events that students want to go to and that all students can go to," she said. "The purpose of AcFee is to fund and hopefully give students the opportunity to come out and enjoy Vanderbilt and campus life." ■

# Vanderbilt Student Film Festival aims to appeal to larger audience

Attendees of the Vanderbilt Student Film Festival will notice a competitive twist to the annual event on Sunday afternoon.

In years past, the Film Festival has been an all-day, non-competitive event that attracted the students participating and their friends. But for its fourth year, student co-directors Stacy Greenberg and Kristina Lyons have made it their goal to improve the festival and make it more appealing to students who are not in the film studies program here at Vanderbilt.

Both Greenberg and Lyons stressed that this year's event will be much different from past years.

"Because it's becoming a more intense program, we wanted to make the festival more intense this year," said Lyons.

The film studies program began offering courses in the fall of 2000, making it one of the youngest departments at Vanderbilt. Because of its age, the department was hesitant to make the festival competitive.

Submission into the Film Festival was cutthroat. There were five pre-screeners, made up of professors from different film-related departments, who reviewed and gave feedback about each of the submitted films. The organization cut over half of the films submitted and compiled them into a 90-minute screening.

"We were overwhelmed with the amount

of submissions, in a good way. We hope the number of submissions correlates with the turnout to the event," Greenberg said.

Leading up to the festival was a 24-hour video race. In mid-March, seven teams were given a genre, plot, live dialogue and 24 hours to make a film. The winning team will be announced at the conclusion of Sunday's event.

"We are going for a shocking, obscure and fun event," said Greenberg. "So come and see a great high-quality film for free."

From 3-4 p.m. a pre-screening reception will be held, with food and raffles in the Sarratt Lobby. From 4-6 p.m., film screenings will be held in Sarratt Cinema, followed by a closing reception with more prizes, awards and entertainment. ■

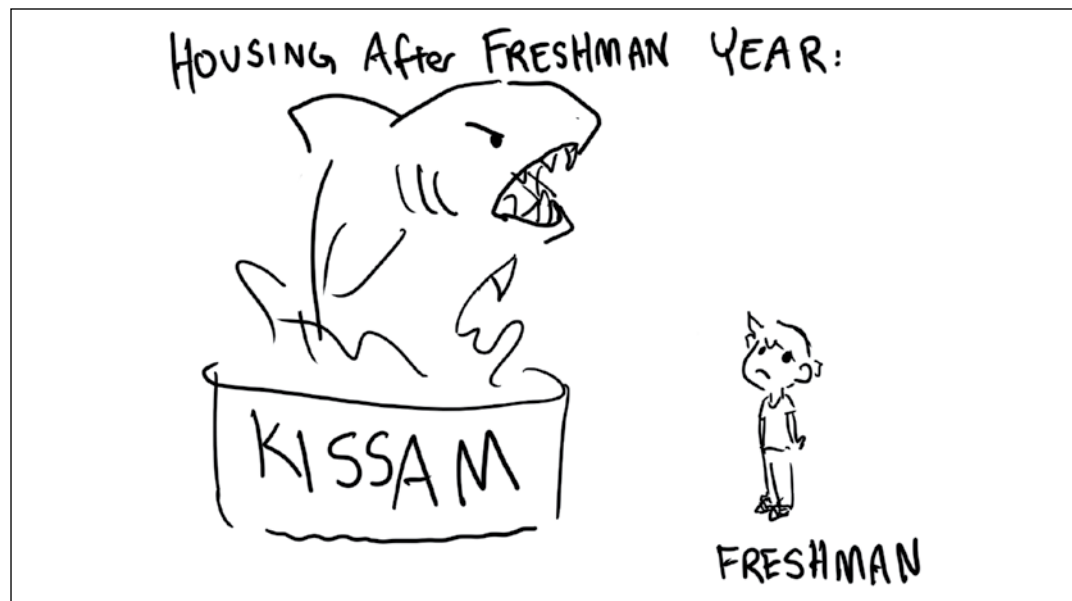

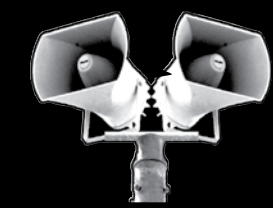

# Catholicism poses problems

# At CNN, racial indignation never sleeps

When Gov. Robert McDonnell of Virginia declared April Confederate History Month, CNN's turgid analysis came down to three words: racism, racism, racism. When Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour called a spade a spade and said the controversy was a "myth" and the issue "doesn't amount to diddly," anchor Rick Sanchez theorized that black Americans are "a constituency his party doesn't care about." The network then balanced Barbour's commentary with the infallible words of self-crowned "anti-racist essayist" and native of Nashville, Tenn., Tim Wise, who called the event an "abomination." Mr. Wise, who labeled the United States "a nation built on a foundation of slavery, disenfranchisement and white domination" and twice compared the Founding Fathers to Afghanistan's "Mujahedeen," became a millionaire giving speeches on his theories of "unearned white privilege." This is the man CNN presents to clarify race topics.

To understand why CNN and Wise are wrong, one must have at least a

fleeting knowledge of world history. As a student of Russian language and literature, my area of interest is Eastern Europe. For instance, the Web site of the president of Ukraine honors the "egalitarian society" of the Cossacks and bears the coat of arms of their leader, Bohdan Khmelnytsky. Hetman Khmelnytsky, a 17th-century Cossack warlord, orchestrated the bloodiest Cossack uprising in history. An estimated 200,000 Poles and Jews were slaughtered by his Cossacks. (In some instances, children were dismembered and cannibalized in front of their parents.) The uprising was romanticized in Nikolai Gogol's novella "Taras Bulba," which Ernest Hemmingway called his favorite book and is immortalized in modern Ukrainian culture. If we accept the logic of CNN and other leftist race baiters, the Ukrainian government is racist and anti-Semitic for honoring this part of its heritage. But of course, no Pole or Jew would label them as such. As a Pole whose great-grandfather was a Jew, the thought never occurred to me.

If the 17th century is too far back in popular memory, allow me to shift my analysis to World War II. A 16-year-old Stefan Durakiewicz witnessed his brother Jan killed by a German rifleman's bullet to the head. My other

grandfather, Jozef Wilk, was kidnapped by fascists at age 17 and became one of over 300,000 Zivilarbeiter (Polish civilian slave laborers in Germany). Due to the Nazi occupation and systematic de-literacization of the conquered populations, none of my grandparents received secondary education. If yours truly — or any other Pole — attempted to blame his shortcomings on "German racism" or "unearned German privilege," he would not only be ridiculed (by fellow Poles), but also scorned as a cynical racial huckster. And the slavery of 1939-1945, unlike American slavery, happened to people who are still alive and active in society today.

Though no thinking person truly believes the Virginia governor is motivated by some latent ultra-racist impulse, the lugubrious Left cannot afford to overlook an opportunity to breed racial resentment and paranoia. Tim Wise's "white privilege" is analogous to the Nazis' "Jewish physics" — both vicious theories seek to delegitimize the motives and actions of people simply because of their race.

## Corey Williams begins a long road to recovery

It's not every day a college baseball pitcher's play makes it onto ESPN's top-10 plays of the day. It's even more unusual when that play is made immediately after the pitcher's kneecap has been split in two by a line drive.

But Corey Williams, a redshirt freshman left-handed pitcher for the Vanderbilt baseball team, did just that during an April 3 afternoon away game against the Florida Gators.

Williams's curveball to Florida's Austin Maddox left Maddox's bat like it had a laser on it, striking Williams's right knee and knocking him to the ground. Still lying on the mound, Williams had the presence of mind to find the baseball, which was nearby on the mound, pick it up with his ungloved hand and toss it backward to first baseman, Aaron Westlake, who tagged Maddox out.

Forty-eight hours later, Williams was in surgery at VUMC to seam together the split bone. Two screws and some wire later, it was swollen but back in one piece, Williams said.

He never got to see his play on ESPN the day it aired since he was busy getting x-rays and finding his way back to Nashville; he couldn't drive back with his leg in that state, but a friend taped the segment and sent it to him.

Williams said the only pain he experienced was when the ball actually struck his knee. Once he straightened his leg, he was much more comfortable.

"As long as I didn't move it at all, I was fine," he said.

After the hit, he said his first instinct was to get the ball to first base, and

though he didn't know what exactly had happened to his knee, he knew it wasn't good.

"I felt my knee on the mound, and there's a huge dent in my kneecap," he said. "I knew something was wrong; I had no idea what, though."

As a redshirt last year, Williams spent the season sitting in the bullpen, so maybe he would be accustomed to the feeling of being sidelined?

"I think it is a little different," he said. "But I've just got to have happy spirits and just work to get better."

So far, the only game Williams has missed this season was the April 4 game in Florida following his injury. Even with a bum knee, he's still a presence at every ballgame.

"I want to be here for the guys and cheer them on," he said. "I'd do anything I can for them to win."

Now in the rehabilitation process, Williams said he keeps it iced and elevated and meets with team trainer Chris Ham to do some leg raises — nothing too serious yet — he said.

He can stand on his leg and apply pressure to it when he's wearing a knee brace, but he's been using a scooter the athletics office rented for him to get to classes. One day, though, the scooter wasn't charged, and he had to use crutches to get from Morgan House to Wilson Hall. It took him 35 minutes.

The goal is to have his knee recovered enough by early July to find a summer team around Nashville where he can pitch a couple innings. And when asked if he was worried about being able to pitch next year, he answered in the same way he made the ESPN top play of the day — without a second of hesitation.

"Oh yeah, I'll be well ready for next season," he said. ■

**CS:** An early start helps with momentum, but consistency is the key to the production on offense. We have also been lucky to have different players step up in every game. It is making us tougher to mark out of a game.

**VH:** How will you use the remaining games on the schedule to prepare for the ALC tournament and NCAAs?

**CS:** Obviously, the key to moving forward is getting better every time you step on the field. We can't ever be content with the level we have reached. Hard work and a lot of film preparation will be the key to our potential success. ■

# A.J. Ogilvy entering NBA Draft: Right decision?

## Good call: It was time for the center to go.

When A.J. Ogilvy announced he was hiring an agent and intended to enter the NBA Draft, the news was likely not met with the response he anticipated. As the story goes, Ogilvy was told secondhand that he would be drafted before the second round. On a second's notice, Ogilvy did what anyone's second nature would be and declared for the draft. Ogilvy was second-guessed, told to get a second opinion and generally treated like a second-class draft prospect, but he refused to have second thoughts. The media questioned his split-second decision, caught a second wind and questioned him some more. The lesson to be learned from this parable is ... wait a second. What if A.J. is doing the right thing?

Critics and naysayers have pointed to Ogilvy's declining numbers at Vanderbilt, citing them as proof that he is not as good as advertised. If he were, he would be improving each year rather than seemingly regressing. The fact of the matter is: Healthy players don't simply lose the ability to make plays overnight. Whether it's an issue of confidence or poor habits or gypsy hex, it doesn't appear that staying at Vanderbilt for another year will be beneficial to A.J.'s game. For whatever reason, he has become a depreciating asset while wearing black and gold. And judging by his last three games, there didn't seem to be much hope on the horizon as long as he stays in Nashville.

Ogilvy's freshman season proves that the foundation is there; it's simply on a new coach to pull up broken floorboards, get back to the fundamentals of Ogilvy's game and build him back from there. Don't get me wrong; Kevin Stallings is a fantastic game coach. But it has become painstakingly apparent that he is just not the right coach for Ogilvy at this juncture in his career. It would behoove both parties to move past their time together and look to the future.

For Ogilvy, this means taking whatever training measures to help solidify himself as the late-first rounder his agent convinced him he can be. Even if he doesn't stick immediately in the NBA, getting tutelage overseas or in the developmental league will have more long-term benefit for Ogilvy than a fourth year under Stallings. Anything he hasn't learned from Stallings in three years isn't going to magically materialize on the court.

For Stallings and the Commodores, this means the beginning of life after A.J. Throw out all the

Dashboard Confessional albums and Disney movies; it's time to move on from Vanderbilt's (faux) golden-haired golden boy. Start giving Festus Ezeli and Steve Tchiengang the reigns to the frontcourt. Until the training wheels come off, neither player will be able to play to his fullest potential.

While it's never easy for a team to lose two of its top players, Ogilvy picked a convenient time to walk away. The team is already moving forward without point guard and senior leader Jermaine Beal, casting some serious question marks on the 2010-2011 season. It's better for the Commodores to shore up all of their gaps at the same time than have to worry about replacing A.J. right after they find an heir to Beal. With A.J. already gone, the Commodores will only anticipate losing one rotation player this time next year in forward Darshawn McClellan. That means the team Stallings ushers out onto the court next November will more or less be the same team that Vandy will hope to field in the 2012 NCAA Tournament. That's a full two years to iron out any of the problems facing this team. That's a full two years to try to gear up for a legitimate run at the national title. Senior Night 2011 might not feel the same without Ogilvy, but cutting down the nets in New Orleans would sure serve as some consolation. Here's to hoping A.J. will be watching alongside his NBA teammates.



## Bad call: Ogilvy made a big-time mistake.

The Big Aussie made a big mistake in forgoing his senior season to declare for the NBA Draft.

I wish A.J. Ogilvy luck in his next step, and of course he has to do what he feels is best, but the NBA seems like a bit of a pipe dream. Also, in making this decision, he leaves behind the chance to improve upon a solid but ultimately unsatisfactory college career at Vanderbilt.

Most prognostications have him as a second-round pick or going undrafted. In either case, the chances of him suiting up for an NBA team next season are highly unlikely; not even Commodore stars Shan Foster and Derrick Byars have been able to see time in an NBA game. Ogilvy will almost surely wind up playing overseas like them.

If he really wants to play in the NBA, he would have been wise to stay a year, become more physical and, more importantly, not enter the Draft in such a stacked year. There are many better big men going to the Draft this season; in a pool that includes the likes of DeMarcus Cousins, Derrick Favors and Greg Monroe, Ogilvy will fall by the wayside.

But he's decided now is the time to leave a program on which he left an indelible mark the past three seasons, a program where day in and day out it was unclear what kind of

play we could expect from him.

One day the big man would be a dominant force in the paint, knock down free throws and effectively take over a game. The next time, Ogilvy often was a non-factor who got out-hustled and out-rebounded by smaller opponents, missed crucial shots and played limited minutes.

When he showed up, Vanderbilt was nearly unstoppable; the Commodores went 22-1 over his three seasons when he scored at least 20 points.

When he didn't show up, the Commodores were one-dimensional; Vanderbilt was a mere 3-10 when Ogilvy scored in single digits.

Worse, Ogilvy's performances dipped when the times mattered most, in March. During his tenure, Vanderbilt went 2-5 in postseason play, including a pair of first-round NCAA Tournament flameouts. His shooting percentages and rebounding totals went down, and as he went the past two seasons, so did the Commodores.

Let's not forget Ogilvy's time in Nashville was, in many ways, a success. Vanderbilt went 26-8, 19-12 and 24-9 during his three years, and he was All-Southeastern Conference every season. Two NCAA berths in three years is nothing to sniff at, and he's only the second player in Commodore history to score 1,000 points and record 100 blocks.

Vanderbilt was absolutely a better basketball team with Ogilvy than without him, and the Commodores will struggle to replace his inside production next season.

But for Ogilvy, there were no NCAA Tournament wins. No SEC titles. No top-10 rankings. No one will be retiring his jersey.

But a lot of people at Vanderbilt will miss him, and he'll miss a chance to end his career on a positive note.

So what will Commodore fans remember him for?

Ogilvy started his college tenure as the toast of Nashville, winning his first 16 games. He ended it flat on his back, hands over his face in disbelief when Murray State nailed a game-winning jumper in this year's NCAA Tournament. It was a brutal end to the season, and it was also a cruel way to end a good career that could have been great.

But with Ogilvy leaving, that's how his legacy will stay.
