# An Essay on the Oxide of Silver. 1

It is not expected, as a general rule, that the Medical Student is qualified by experience to produce an essay which shall contain any thing new to the Profession or, at least, to those from whom he has derived his knowledge of Medicine. Yet it sometimes happens that Students have ascertained, by experience, or from some other source, some important truth in connection with their study, which, though it may be known to a few, should be revealed to the whole Profession. To acquire a thorough knowledge of what is known relating to Medicine and to endeavor to further that knowledge by that attention which the subject, in all its connections, deserves; should be the grand object of those who embark in the study of a profession which should be characterized for its utility, dignity, and responsibility. With this great object in view I proceed to mention the virtues of the medicine

which forms the subject of my Thesis; in doing so however I deem it superfluous to mention the mode of preparing it. And I shall proceed to enumerate the diseases in which it is peculiarly applicable and shall dwell more minutely on those which have come under my own observation.

The Oxide of Silver has been administered in different diseases for several years, but I believe has never had the importance attached to it which it so justly merits. My brother Dr C. M. Mendum has recently given great attention to this medicine as a remedy in the treatment of sexual affections and the relief which attended the administration of it was far greater than any known efficacy of the remedy had warranted him to expect.

In Sypesia arising from an irritated state of the Stomach and in which there is a feeling of distension, when only a small

quantity of food had been taken and in which  
the bowels become constipated and thus it a  
sense of oppression, with occasional paroxysms  
of chilliness, in which the patient manifests  
considerable disquietude; relief may be obtained  
and a cure effected by the administration  
of the oxide of Silver. I have seen three  
cases of this description in which many  
and various remedies had been used, but  
without any permanent relief. Not only have  
I seen, but have experienced, the happy change  
which results from the use of this remedy  
in despatched of the above description. It is  
with pleasure of no ordinary degree that I dwell  
upon a remedy which relives me of that  
which rendered life itself a burden. Most  
of the professors of the University of Louisville  
and many eminent practitioners of the South  
had prescribed for me and yet the relief in

Every instance was disappointment. My Brother treated me for eight or ten months without procuring other than temporary relief, until he advised me to use the Oude of Silis, accompanying the direction with the remark that if that remedy did not give me relief he would be forced to admit that he could not relieve me, as all the other remedies which he had successfully employed in similar cases had proved of no avail in mine. fifteen was the third. She seems to have  
a great tendency to Syphilitis, with the  
peculiar train of Symptoms which I have  
enumerated, in my Pastoral family, her  
husband having fallen a victim to the  
disease a number of years since. In this  
case there was distension of the Coats  
and nerves of the Stomach. The most  
powerful remedies were used to bring  
about a proper degree of contraction, but  
alas! they all failed yet I have no  
doubt but that the tone of the Stomach  
would have been restored and life thereby  
prolonged, if the Oxide of Silver had been  
administered before the disease had pro-  
gressed so far, that every remedy was  
useless, for I seriously think that in

the course of one or two years and perhaps  
in much less time, so Medicine would  
have been of very service to me.

We sometimes employ remedies of the same  
properties for the relief of conditions which are  
of directly opposite character and yet these  
things are solved upon physiological princi-  
ples. for instance Congestion and a high  
inflammatory condition may be relieved  
by depletion - the cause may be the same  
and yet the result is very different. Thus it  
is in the two abnormal conditions Amaurosis  
& Splanchnorrhœa - the former may arise from  
an atonic condition of the system and  
the latter from a <sup>congestion</sup> inflammatory of the  
system and particularly the organs directly  
concerned these durations from the normal state are  
sometimes, I may say, of infinite production of the  
most serious consequences and in the treatments

of these affections I beg leave to suggest  
the Oxide of Silver. I think it will prove  
to be of intrinsic value and from the  
good which I have seen to result from  
its use, I feel justified in commanding  
it - to the consideration of those to whom  
this is submitted. This remedy seems  
to act - in the first affection by imparting  
vital energy to the Nerves and appen-  
dages concerned and in the latter it  
modifies the sub-inflammatory condi-  
tion of the parts - The tendency of  
this medicine appears to be the produc-  
tion of a healthy action whether the  
existing state of things be above or  
below the natural standard. The manner  
in which it exerts this peculiar influ-  
ence where there exist an opposite  
condition of things I am unable to say

At this is a matter I think worthy of  
consideration I hope that my learned  
instructors will reveal the modest operan-  
di of this remedy in the affections  
lastly revealed to-

Whoever feels an interest in the physical  
condition of mankind and adheres to  
the great law of that God who wisely  
directs all things must be convinced  
that to multiply and replenish is a  
law of primary importance and that  
those who endeavor to procure the fulfillment  
of this injunction labor to support a divine  
command.

It is not infrequently observed that conjugal  
felicity domestic peace and happiness are  
interrupted on account of the usual conse-  
quences of marriage being deferred in some  
instances for a brief period in others for life

In the great majority of these cases the great desired end can be brought about by the administration of proper remedies agents and the physician is the medium through which the desired object is accomplished - it is through him that all abnormal conditions are expected to be obviated - Oftentimes females are thought to be sterile and indeed they are for the time being when conception is prevented by an insatiable condition of the uterus or some part of it and the irritation may be so slight that the subjects would soon submit to remedies generally local - for the cure of the same and thus conception may be presented for years. In reliev ing this state of things and giving proper tone to the uterus and its appendages I know no remedy which will succeed so well as the Oxide of Silver given in half grain doses

Three times per day for six or eight days. The remedy should not be used during menstruation. My brother has employed this medicine in a number of cases, sufficient at least, it would seem, to prove the utility of it. Some of these subjects had given birth to one or two children, others had been married from three to five years. Had never conceived and yet, as remarkable as it may appear, they all, without an exception, conceived within six weeks after the administration of the syrups of Salvia. Last Autumn I gave the same remedy to a lady who had been wedded nearly three years. her form was perfect, her health good, her Catamenia had always appeared regularly. I supposed Conjugal excitement to be the chief cause of nonconception. the want of the womb becoming irritated impeded the same

to other portions of it. In two or three days after menstruation I commenced giving her the Oxide of Silver in half grain doses and continued it three times per diem until she had taken ten grains in the short time of three weeks she became pregnant as the symptoms characteristic of the early state of pregnancy proved.

To my brother I am also indebted for a communication showing the great virtue of the Oxide of Silver in the treatment of Syphilitic ulcers. I think it was in the early part of last Spring that one of the Contributors to the London Lancet suggested this remedy as a local application in the treatment of this species of ulcer. My brother having to treat an very malignant case the past

summer and failing to effect to effect  
a cure with the usual remedies, yellow-  
wash black-wash Sulphate of Copper  
and the Nitrate of Silver was induced to  
employ the Ridge of Silver and he found  
that the ulcer healed speedily under  
its application. In a second case  
of great trouble in which the Sulphate  
of Copper and Nitrate of Silver failed  
to cure, he applied Nitric Acid to  
one ulcer and the Ridge of Silver to  
another situated in close proximity,  
the former granulated slowly from the  
bottom the latter granulated rapidly  
from the circumference and bottom.  
In a few days the latter entirely  
disappeared and the one which was  
healed with the Nitric Acid had  
diminished only about half its orig-  
inal size the patient suffering the result  
of the two different applications whilst

upon the application of the more successful one to the remaining view, his wife was compelled with an speedy cure was the result -

In common or simple ulcers where the Nitrate of Silver or Nitric Acid comes to indicate and I may say even where there exists considerable irritation, the Silver ointment is, in my opinion far preferable. Early in October last I received an injury directly over the Fibia about mid-way between the knee and ankle joints. It was at first very superficial, but from undue exertion of the limb, together with bad weather, it became deep and extensive. The excessive inflammation being subdued I endeavored with the remedies usually employed in such cases to excite granulations, but failed.

then applied the Ossis of Silver and Silver  
before has I seen an ulcer of any description  
heal so rapidly and safely - The mode in  
which it was employed both in the Simple  
and malignant ulcers which I have men-  
tioned was in the form of an ointment, com-  
posed of two grains of the Ossis of Silver and one  
drachm of Lead.

This preparation of Silver has been advantage-  
ously employed in Philadelphia - May it not be useful  
in Chorea?

In conclusion allow me to express the hope that you  
will not infer from the ardor with which I have  
dwelt on the efficacy, real or apparent, of the med-  
icine which is the subject of my Thesis, that I  
am so wrapped up in any single article of med-  
icine that I regard it - as a Cameal and neglect  
others of much greater importance
